But by far the most bulky volume in interlinguistics published during the year is Künzli's (2006d) encyclopedia on universal languages in Switzerland. Over 1,129 pages, its author provides information on the history, institutions and players in the movements for Volapük, Esperanto, Ido, Occidental-Interlingue, and Interlingua in Switzerland. Parts of the volume are in German, French and Italian, but the encyclopedia entries themselves are in Esperanto; and the Esperanto movement, historically much the largest, is given most of the attention. The project brings together a vast amount of material, though the lack of a comprehensive index makes navigation difficult.
